#### WHEN PLANS CHANGE

All of us are experiencing something we have never experienced before. Schedules have been disrupted, events have been cancelled, our work approach has shifted, dates are being pushed back, and even the normal worship assembly has been suspended. Of course, it is all in the interest of our health with the onset of the Coronavirus. Yet, it is still frustrating not being able to proceed with what we had planned to do. It definitely reminds us of what James said about making lots of plans—"Ye know not what shall be on the morrow" (James 4:14). Plans are always subject to change! If anybody realized this the most, it had to be the apostle Paul.

Just think about how Paul began as a persecutor of Christians. His plan was to take Christians as prisoners to Jerusalem, but that all changed when Jesus appeared to him and he obeyed the Gospel in Damascus instead (Acts 9:18). Later it was Saul (Paul) whom the Holy Spirit separated for missionary work (Acts 13:1-3). Paul would preach in the Synagogue in Antioch in Pisidia, but the next week his plans changed as the Jews were filled with envy and Paul turned his attention to the Gentiles (Acts 13:45,46). Next, in Iconium Paul preached for a long time but there was an assault made and he fled to Lystra where he was stoned and then to Derbe (Acts 14:3,6,19,20). When the next missionary journey began, Paul planned for him and Barnabas to go again and visit the brethren in every city where they had preached, but that plan even changed as Barnabas wanted to take John Mark and Paul did not (Acts 15:36-41). Paul chose Silas (along with Timothy) but their plans changed when they wanted to preach in Asia and Bithynia because the Holy Spirit did not allow them (Acts 16:6,7). In Corinth, as the church was growing, perhaps out of fear of more persecution, Paul planned to leave, but the Lord changed his plans and

he stayed for a year and six months (Acts 18:1-11). As Paul continued to preach amidst persecution, his great desire was to see Rome (Acts 19:21). He would ultimately fulfill this desire, but not as he planned—he would be a prisoner (Acts 23:11). For two years, he was under "house arrest" but he continued to preach the Gospel (Acts 28:30,31)--just not as he planned!

So, what does this mean for us? Even though our normal schedule and plans have changed, we are still Christians and must serve and worship God no matter what. Paul did not let the various changes and extremes in his life cause him to forsake this duty. Neither did the early Christians who had been gathering for worship at Jerusalem when their lives were changed. For their own safety, they were scattered and had to continue to worship for a time outside of a formal gathering (Acts 8:1-4). The same is true for us. What has happened to the church for now (in removing ourselves physically from each other and our communities) is certainly not something that we planned, nor is it something that will continue. It doesn't mean that we have removed ourselves from working for God or worshipping God, it just means our plans have changed temporarily. For Paul, his troubles actually worked out for the "furtherance of the gospel" (Phi. 1:12). It could be, that in the end, the same could be said for the church today (Rom. 8:28).
